

Theodora "Teddy" Weston By Abbie Stover

Fortunately, the Weston's decided to settle in Winterport.

Teddy has contributed a great deal toward the preservation of our history and has been the archivist for our Historical Association for many years. Her collection of vital statistics is of great interest to researchers seeking information pertaining to their genealogy. Her presentations to the local schools and to members and guests at the Winterport Historical Association are always of great interest. She has collected and organized information pertaining to the many cemeteries. She has always had a great interest in the Union Meeting House. Teddy has been a member of the woman's club since 1957 and some of the residents probably remember her as one of their teachers at local schools. Her generous contributions to Winterport are second to none and greatly appreciated.

BOSTON POST CANE

On November 10, 2005 at North Winterport, the Town Council of Winterport, Maine presented Winterport's Boston Post Cane to Ernest Tuttle. He was born at Jolicoeur, New Brunswick, Canada on February 15, 1909, the year that the Boston Post Canes were first distributed. Town Councilors James A.B. Patterson and Susan Rioux were joined at the presentation by Leo L. LaChance, Town Manager as well as two of Ernest's daughters Kathi Peterson and her husband, Gary of Minot, Maine and Meredith Clements, who lives in an addition on the farm, and has been there to help with Irene and Ernest since 1991.

At the age of 19 during 1928, Ernest visited the United States and found work. He said the pay was great so the decided to stay. He graduated from Brockton Evening High School in Massachusetts and went to work for Producers Dairy. One benefit was they could eat a gallon of ice cream after work! He and his wife, Irene moved to 1688 North Main Street in 1935. Ernest became a U.S. citizen in the 1930's. He began a long career of farming, after they purchased the 60 acre Tuttle Farm. Among other jobs Ernest had were, driving school bus for the Town of Hampden (he loved seeing the children) and several years with the State of Maine traveling testing cows for the Maine Dairy Herd Improvement Association.

Ernest and his wife, Irene who died in January 2004, together raised 5 children. The other children are Jeanne Foster, Stephen Tuttle and Ralph Tuttle. (Ralph passed away in 1989.) Irene was a Winterport Grade School teacher. She was one of Maine's outstanding volunteers. She received numerous awards including a Gubernatorial Award for Outstanding Service volunteering with Maine Department of Health and Human Services.

April, 2007

Well this year has been a lot better for personal than last year. Don't let your head get to big Phil, but our Town Manager and staff are doing a great job.

Roads are always a big issue, but I think we are getting a handle on them. This last year we put overlay on a couple of roads and finished the North Road with black top and started on the Perkins Road. When I came on board 18 years ago, we had 18 miles of dirt roads, now we have about 5 miles left. We did a lot of ditching and thanks to Phil there were some big trees that were taken care of.

Our plow contractor did a great job this past winter, this is the first winter I can remember that we had an accident and we didn't have to take anyone to the hospital.

Solid waste has been busy as usual. We had a universal waste building built this year. Rick Sibley is doing a great job supervising the Transfer Station. Also we had a new compactor installed, which was badly needed.

The Music Festival was a great success, thanks to Phil and the committee who worked his butt off to make it happen. I know the Festival this year will be even better.

I hope this gives you a view of some of the things that has been going on over the past year.

TOWN MANAGERS REPORT

It is hard to believe that another year has flown by and that I have been on the job for one year and four months. It has been very gratifying to see the response we have received from the community towards everything that has been accomplished this year. From our inaugural Winterport Music Festival, the building of our Universal Waste facility, the maintenance and upkeep of the town roads, to the daily interaction with our residents at the town hall, transfer station, and at recreational events, I have received nothing but good reports, a testimony to the town's employees and their positive attitude.

Winterport continues to grow at a steady pace. This past year we had 35 new one family homes built, 1 two family home, along with 3 mobile homes, all of which have been great additions to our town. The planning board has reviewed some new housing developments along with working on a proposed low income elderly housing project to be built on Dean Street. We have seen an upswing in small businesses with the opening of the Fountain House, Always Green, Riverside Hair Design, and the Sub Shop to name just a few. Please make sure that you welcome all of these new people to our town when you have the chance and help support our local economy by frequenting all Winterport businesses, old and new. I hope that everyone has noticed the renovation work that has taken place at the Union Meeting House which is pictured on our cover this year. This has been accomplished by the hard work of the Meeting House Association and the generosity of the townspeople and others who have seen the need to help restore a wonderful historic building. At town meeting we will be looking to provide some extra funds this year to the Union Meeting House in order for them to meet their goal of \$50,000.00 dollars which will then be matched by an anonymous donor.

The 2nd Annual Winterport Music Festival will take place on Saturday August 4th at the Abbott Park Recreational Facility. We had close to 1,000 people attend last year's event and we received numerous compliments, not only on the wonderful music, but the great food that was available to the festival goers. This year I am very excited that "Dave Mallett" has committed to being our headline act, not only is he a <u>national recording artist</u>, but a Maine Native. He rounds off a very diverse group of talent that will appeal to a wide variety of musical tastes. I hope to see you there.

The Town Council and I need your help! Included in this year's town report is a "Citizen Survey" that we ask you complete and bring with you to town meeting or drop off at the town office. We would like to know; how well we are doing (or not doing)? - is the town headed in the right direction? - are you concerned about future growth? - are we addressing the town's needs? - How can we improve? - Or, are you satisfied with the status quo? Remember this is your town and we work with your best interests in mind but we need your input to make sure that Winterport remains the type of town we all want and one that we love to call home.

I am sure you also noticed something slightly different in regards to the "Dedication" of the Town report. The Council realizes there are numerous individuals throughout the town that have spent time and energy over the years working both in the public eye and behind the scenes for the good of our town. In an effort to recognize as many of these individuals as possible they decided for the first time to dedicate the report to three individuals. Joe Watson, Stanley Bowden, and Teddy Weston have been invaluable to our town in many different ways and I want to thank them for their tireless effort and community spirit. Unfortunately Joe passed away this year so if you see his family around town please let them know, along with Stan and Teddy, how much each one of them has meant to Winterport.

I look forward to seeing all of you at Town Meeting and promise you that I will do my best working with you and for you as Town Manager and please when you are at the town office make sure you say hello.

BOARD OF ASSESSORS REPORT

To the Citizens of Winterport:

We continue to meet as a Board on the second Wednesday of each month at 5 p.m. at the Town Office. Our meetings are open to the public and all citizens are encouraged to attend.

Due to ever increasing real estate market pressures, local taxpayers may notice changes in their assessed values on their tax bills this year. Any time our local assessed valuation falls below the state assessed valuation by 10% or more, we are required to choose between increasing the local valuation and accepting significant reductions in exemptions. This year is another of those times.

Homestead Exemption application forms are available at the Town Office or the Maine Revenue Services at (207) 626-8475 or at <u>www.janus.state.me.us/revenue</u>.

In calendar year 2006 the Assessors approved 23 real estate abatements totaling \$9,553.98. Supplemental assessments were issued for 3 taxpayer accounts, totaling \$4,275.00.

WINTERPORT FIRE & RESCUE ASSOCIATION

To the Citizens of Winterport

The Winterport Fire and Rescue Association is a group of volunteers who are dedicated to lending a helping hand to the citizens of Winterport and surrounding towns. The association operates the Ambulance Service and performs a number of volunteer tasks which prepare us to assist you. The members donate many hours receiving training to be prepared to render aid on the ambulance when you are sick or injured and to be prepared with equipment, such as the Jaws of Life, to assist the ambulance service at accident scenes. The ambulance attendants and drivers donate untold hours responding to calls. On the fire side of the slate the volunteers attend training four times a month. This training is everything from how to operate the different pieces of equipment we have, safety, traffic control and fire suppression. This year federally mandated communications training has been in the fore front as without this training the town would not have been eligible to submit any grant applications this coming year.

The association also takes on a number of volunteer activities, including: Placing the Christmas decorations and the banners which take there place during the rest of the year; Providing traffic control for various function such as the annual Christmas Pageant and Parades;

This year we have begun looking into how the association might find a way to replace our aging rescue truck which is a conversion of one of our old ambulances. This vehicle has served the purpose well but is now in need of replacement. We are hopeful that we will be able to find an affordable way to replace this with a vehicle specifically designed for the purpose rather than the association members making another conversion of a vehicle that was intended for another use. We hope to be able to have hopes of being able to locate a used vehicle which still has a lot of good life left and is being replaced by another department solely due to growth.

We have audited the accompanying general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Winterport, Maine, as of and for the fiscal year-ended June 30, 2006, as listed in the table of contents. These general-purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town of Winterport, Maine's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general-purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted by the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general-purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general-purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general-purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1C to the financial statements, management has not recorded certain general infrastructure assets in governmental activities and, accordingly, has not recorded depreciation expense on those assets. Management has also not presented government-wide financial statements to display the financial position and changes in financial position of its governmental activities, business-type activities, and discretely presented component units. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the general infrastructure assets be capitalized and depreciated, which would increase the assets, net assets, and expenses of the governmental activities. The amount by which this departure would affect the assets, net assets, and expenses of the governmental activities is not reasonably determinable. Accounting principles also require the presentation of government-wide financial statements. The amounts that would be reported in government-wide financial statements for the Town's governmental activities, business-type activities, and discretely presented component units are not reasonably determinable.

In our opinion, because of the effects of the matters discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above do not present fairly, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of the Town of Winterport, Maine, as of June 30, 2006, or the changes in its financial position or its cash flows, where applicable, for the fiscal year then ended.

Dear Mr. Watson:

I am writing today regarding the property of Carline Dunham, located at 1649 N. Main Street in Winterport, Maine. Last summer, I was contacted by Tracey Wellman of ERA Dawson Realty to help determine whether this parcel of land can be removed from Resource Protection zoning before it is sold. The property has severe slopes on two sides of the peninsula and is surrounded by coastal salt marshes and meadows. On August 8, 2006, I wrote to you that a split district consisting of the first 150 feet (horizontal distance) from the upland edge of the coastal wetland is designated Resource Protection, and the remaining 100 feet of shoreland zone is designated Limited Residential, would be acceptable to the Department.

Since that letter, Ms. Dunham has had the property surveyed. According to the survey (please see attached), the maximum distance the slope extends into the shoreland zone in 99 feet. With this new information, the Department would approve an amendment to the Winterport Land Use Ordinance which places this property into a split district of Resource Protection for the first 125 feet (horizontal distance) from the upland edge of the coastal wetland with the remaining 125 feet of shoreland zone designated as Limited Residential.

Dick,

Thank you for meeting with me and Ed McCurdy yesterday at the site of his proposed condominium project off Main Road, between the Olver Associates property and the Steamship facility.

The McCurdy property is currently zoned Limited Commercial pursuant to the Town's shoreland zoning ordinance. In that district the current standards allow one dwelling unit per 30,000 square feet of lot area and per 150 feet of shore frontage. Lot coverage is also limited. No more than 20% of the lot can be covered by unvegetated surfaces.

As you know, Mr. McCurdy has developed several proposals for placing condominiums on the lot, which I understand is about an acre in size. Under the current ordinance only one dwelling unit can be constructed on the parcel, but the proposals have included up to eight units. Clearly, the ordinance would have to be amended if Mr. McCurdy's plans are to move forward in some way. Amendments may have to address lot size per dwelling, shore frontage per dwelling; and perhaps lot coverage.

While the Department would be receptive to the town amending its standards within the limits of the small area of Limited Commercial Districting, I do not believe that it would accept an amendment allowing eight dwelling units on the parcel. We recognize that: the lot is served by town sewer and water, it is located along the commercial main street (Route 1A); the 1992 comprehensive plan includes this area in the growth area; and there are other buildings with more than one dwelling in nearby structures. However, based on the current level of development in the area, I would not recommend reducing the required minimum lot size per dwelling within the shoreland zone of the Limited Commercial District to less than 10,000 square feet.

Under the above scenario, if Mr. McCurdy has more than 40,000 square feet of land area, after subtracting any portion of the lot that is coastal wetland, he would be able to develop four dwelling units. However, it is still unclear what portion of Mr. McCurdy's land between the base of the slope and the open water is actually coastal wetland. Mr. McCurdy should have a wetlands delineation done to determine what part of the lot may be freshwater wetland and what part may be considered to be coastal wetlands. Coastal wetland area can not be counted toward lot area for the purpose of calculating the number of dwellings allowed on the site.

The above comments reflect my thoughts based on our site visit and the adjacent developments. I am not implying that the town must amend its ordinance to permit four units. Rather, I am just trying to provide some limits by which the town should consider at it deals with this matter. The Mandatory Shoreland Zoning Act does permit municipalities to adopt a different set of standards than those contained in the *State of Maine Guidelines* for *Municipal Shoreland Zoning Ordinances*. It must however, provide documentation to the DEP that there are unique circumstances in the area that warrant the town adopting those different standards.

THE NEIGHBOR'S CUPBOARD April 2007

The Neighbor's Cupboard is the emergency food resource for low income families, the working poor, and other families in distress in Winterport and Frankfort. This is our nineteenth year. We are a non-profit organization located at the Calvary Apostolic Church on Route 1A. We welcome those in need or those who wish to donate to visit the Cupboard or reach Donna Allen by phone.

The Neighbor's Cupboard is open every Wednesday from 9:00 to 10:00 A.M. In 2006, 139 different families used the Cupboard for a total of 795 visits. Over 1870 bags of food were distributed. A few emergency food packs are kept at the Winterport Town Office for distribution by Office staff to those in need after Cupboard hours.

We are supported by food drives and fundraisers throughout the year. Smith and Wagner School food drives and the annual Letter Carriers Food Drive combine to provide two months of food. The Stephanie Dunton Monthly Food Drive is an ambitious effort by a Wagner 7th grader and her family. Maine Savings Federal Credit Union donated both food and money from their annual awareness effort. Special thanks to the community members who continue to coordinate and staff these food drives. An annual request for funds is mailed to the community each November. We thank the community for its very generous financial support. We are especially thankful for the tons of food we obtain from the Good Shepherd Food Bank and the Weston Bakery. We are the designated distributor of USDA "surplus foods".

The Neighbor's Cupboard coordinated the efforts of the Calvary Apostolic, Frankfort Congregational, St. Gabriel's, and United Methodist churches and some private individuals to give out 41 holiday food baskets at Thanksgiving and 29 at Christmas. The Easter Bunny donated 5 Easter dinners.

Our Baby Layette program helped 4 new moms and their babies this year by providing new and used outfits, sheets, towels, blankets, hand made items, and baby care books.

Our heartfelt thanks go to the wonderful organizations, businesses and town folk who through your volunteer hours and donations of food and money support the Neighbor's Cupboard. Special thanks go to the Cupboard volunteers: Charlotte Bingham, Margaret DeCamp, Fran Deckers, Francis Kingsbury, Leo Lachance, Frances McFarland, Coleen Rancourt, Keith Ritchie, Susan Rizza, George White, Betty Williams, Deb Williams, and very special helpers: Sam Butler and Stanley Bowden.

There were only 18 new housing starts and 2 mobile homes located in town this year, compared to 26 new houses and 6 modular and mobile homes in 2005. These figures show a definite decline in home building and manufacturing housing. That also is the reason for the decline in the number of plumbing permits issued this year.

This year 2006 is the first year that we have had a negative growth in housing since 1997, when I first came to work for the Town of Winterport. However in talking with other towns, I find that they are experiencing the same trend.

I still receive many calls from the residents of town asking for information and many out of town people inquiring about numerous things; building permit fees, acreage required, setbacks from property lines, road frontage, certificates of occupancy etc. All of which we have none.

We had a number of subdivision lots approved this year however the majority of them have not completed their roadways, resulting in many lots yet to be offered for sale

We are still working on <u>Junk Yards</u>, and <u>Automobile Graveyards</u>, don't be surprised if you be receive a letter asking you to <u>clean up your yard</u> and getting rid of <u>more than</u> <u>two un-registered or un-inspected motor vehicles</u> on your property, it is The State of Maine Law.

- 3. Grara/Littlefield Cemetery
- 4. Clements Cemetery
- 5. Ellingwoods Corner Cemetery
- 6. Twining Cemetery
- 7. Cole Cemetery

Lebanon Road Rt. 1 A and Old County Road Goshen Road Monroe Road Rt. 69/Ellingwoods Corner Twining Road Meadow Road

In addition to providing a final resting place, these cemeteries are also one of the best sources of history of the people of Winterport, commemorating citizens and soldiers from as far back as the Revolutionary War. Unfortunately, time and neglect have put us in danger of losing permanently some of this history, especially in the smaller cemeteries. The Cemetery District is committed to preserving this part of our heritage.

Grave lots in the Cemeteries are available for **\$225 per grave (\$75 per grave and \$150 for perpetual care**). Although the traditional sales of graves in lots of six are still available, they are also available individually or in groups of less than six. 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Dear Citizens of Winterport,

We wish to thank you, the citizens of Winterport, for your continued support of the Union Meeting House. Without your support, we would be unable to continue our efforts to preserve the building. Our goal is to preserve and maintain the Meeting House so that it continues to serve the community.

Scaffolding went up in February to repair the steeple. We were able to begin the work due to various fund raising efforts, e.g., the Mile Long Yard Sale selling used books and Music Festival selling blueberry pie and iced tea. We will participate in these events again in 2007.

Other fund raising activities include collecting old cell phone and spent ink or laser jet cartridges for recycling. If you have any of these items, as well as unwanted paperback books to contribute, call 223-9950 for pick-up. In September we participated in Macy's "Shop for A Cause" campaign and plan to again this year.

The really exciting news is an anonymous donor willing to contribute \$100,000 to the steeple repairs. The donor pledged \$50,000 in 2006 if we raised the same amount by December 1. A combination of grants from MBNA, Narraganset Number One Foundation, Stephen & Tabitha King Foundation; fundraising activities; members' dues and individual donations, plus the \$5,000 from last year's Town Warrant enabled us to meet the goal.

We received a check for \$50,000 in late December. We now need to raise the second \$50,000. Our success will not only give us funds to complete the repairs to the steeple in 2007, but also begin to provide funding for improvements to the building such and heat, lighting and plumbing in later years. The anonymous donor will match every dollar we raise in 2007, up to \$50,000. If we cannot raise the full amount, we will have to wait to paint the areas that are repaired, incurring an additional expense to have the scaffolding set up a second time.

Time is of the essence. In November we put plywood over the front window because panes of glass had cracked from the pressure on the window frame due to the compression of rotting support columns. Fearing the entire window would fail during a wind, rain or snow event, engineers advised protecting the interior beforehand by covering the window with plywood.

The firm of Nickerson and O'Day began work on the tower in based of the pledge of the anonymous donor and our history of, and commitment to working hard to raise funds to maintain the building. Your continued generous support of the Meeting House is needed now more than ever to insure that we meet the challenge pledge.

As part of this special fund raising event to save the steeple, those contributing \$1,000 to \$2,499 will have their names engraved on a special plaque in the foyer of the building. Those contributing \$2,500 or more may sponsor a pew and have their name plus the name of the original owner of the pew on a brass plaque attached to the pew they sponsor.

We also need volunteers/donated items to help with the following to keep restoration cost down:

- Trucking building debris to a burn site
- Cutting molding for application to the building
- Dimension lumber such as rough sawn Hemlock beams or planks •
- Electrical work .
- Priming and possibly some building painting.

John Harrington presented a history of Winterport farming on January 8. The decline in the number of farms and acreage being utilized was of great interest. The 1861 Maine Subscribers' Business Directory contained statistics pertaining to the population of Winterport-2380, horses-232, milk cows-456 and working oxen-212. The farms raised 21,718 bushels of oats and 6997 pounds of wool. The history of the many poultry farms producing broilers in Winterport was of particular interest, how the businesses started, financing, stocking, and operation. Many families in the area owned poultry farms: Charles, Elmer and Harold Clements, Frank Newey, Carroll Willson, etc. Several farmers had large apple orchards and shipped Maine apples to markets in the US and some overseas.

On February 12, Teddy Weston, Archivist, presented a program about Frederick Ferdinand Low, born in Frankfort, Maine, on 30 June 1828. He was a grandson of Daniel Low who bought land and settled in the Goshen area in 1792. Frederick left home at the age of 15 and became an apprentice in a shipping firm in Boston. By 1849 he joined the rush to find gold in California. His success in that state led him to a term in Congress, and he became the ninth governor of the state of California in 1864. President Andrew Johnson appointed him Ambassador to China. The millions of visitors to the Golden Gate Park might be surprised if they knew the man who established this park came from Frankfort, Maine. In addition, he was instrumental in establishing the University of California. One of the buildings on the Berkeley Campus is called Lowe Hall.

Maine Granite Quarry Historians, Steve Haynes and Juanita Sprague, brought a large collection of tools, photographs, etc. to our March 12 meeting. They presented a program on

the history of Grenci & Ellis, Inc., owners of the Mt. Waldo Granite Corporation in Frankfort, until its close in 1966. A great deal of the work at the quarry was done by hand until modern equipment was made available. Numerous buildings in the United States were built with Mt. Waldo granite, the Cathedral of St. John the Divine and St. Patrick's Cathedral both located in New York City, plus many others – Bancroft Hall at the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, MD, post offices, libraries, New England Mutual Life in Boston and the construction of Fort Knox are a few of the projects. Grenci & Ellis employed a variety of trades and represented a valuable contribution to Winterport and the surrounding communities.

This year I asked the budget committee and the Town Council to put a small excavator into the budget so we could maintain our ditches before they got to the point of needing huge, expensive to hire, equipment to clean them out. We are always going to have ditches and they will always need attention.

Waldo County Sheriff's Office Annual Report 2006

To the Citizens of Waldo County,

Accompanying this report you will find statistics for your individual Towns regarding the Law Enforcement Activity performed by the Waldo County Sheriff's Deputies. You will see a different format due to the fact that we have employed a new Computer Aided Dispatch and Law Enforcement Records system part way through the year. We like the new reports better as they are much easier to read and offer far more information for both you the public and us in law enforcement. You may also see that our activity may actually be down some in many of your towns. This is quite likely due to our Resource Management Agreement with the Maine State Police. By working together with the Maine State Police and other local and state agencies, we are better able to coordinate responses to calls and spread out the workload, enabling officers from all agencies to provide a better quality service, quicker response times, and minimize the need for additional personnel which ultimately saves tax dollars. Officer's out in the field are better able to investigate and follow up on criminal complaints, bringing them to conclusion, and apprehending the violators where before we were often times just "putting out fires" and moving on to the next.

The Jail population continues to exceed the capacity of the jail, however with the opening of the new Lincoln-Sagadahoc, Two Bridges Jail, along with the new York County Jail, we are able to board out our excess inmates where prior to, we were forced to jam them into our jail which caused a crowded and unsafe environment. While this is a good temporary alternative to a new facility, we will still need to continue to look for a long term solution. We will be continuing to look for this solution with the assistance of local leaders in the county in the upcoming year. Our neighbors to the North and South face similar problems, creating opportunities for collaboration in finding the solution. Ultimately this problem belongs to all of us and will require us all to resolve it. Our continued work in corrections with innovative programming such as the Restorative Justice Reentry Program, VOA Pre-trail and Post Conviction Programs, Day Reporting, Substance Abuse Counseling, Community Resolution Teams and Restorative School Discipline are just but a few programs that we are attempting to use to break the cycle of criminal behavior in individuals and ultimately reduce the jail bed needs here in Waldo County.

As I always remind you all with my annual reports, we are YOUR SHERIFF'S OFFICE and are accountable to you the citizens of Waldo County. I encourage anyone to call or stop in should they have any concerns in your communities or with this agency. We are here to serve you, the Citizens of Waldo County.

Winterport Volunteer Ambulance Service Report

As most of you know, in December of 2005 Chief Stan Bowden retired from the Ambulance & Fire services after 43 years of committed service to our community, leaving a BIG gap to be filled.

In 2005 we responded to 304 ambulance calls. With 2-3 people on each call giving an estimated 1,824 man hours that was donated in call time to the ambulance service.

This is the 37th year of operating an ambulance service in Winterport.

For the calendar year of 2006, we answered 277 ambulance calls.

Our average call lasts about 2 hours with 2-3 people on each call giving us an estimated 1,662 donated man hours for calls. Time is also given to keep up training to stay licenced, administration time (record keeping and paying bills etc.), cleaning and maintenance of the ambulance, for an approximate total of 2,400 man hours that are donated to the service.

We would not have W V A S if we did not have dedicated personnel to call upon. The Officers wish to thank cach one for their time and dedication. We also thank their families for their sacrifices in allowing them time to answer calls. Whether in the middle of a meal, the middle of the night, or just in delaying something they were planning to do.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT WINTERPORT WATER DISTRICT 2006

I am pleased to present my annual report to the Town of Winterport as Treasurer and Superintendent of the Winterport Water District.

2006 was a very busy year for our joint water and sewer utility. As a result of new legislation introduced in Augusta in 2006 the Winterport Water District and Winterport Sewer District were merged into one utility now known as the Winterport Water District (WWD). Having both utilities under one entity has resulted in new operating efficiencies for the District and its customers. Also through the new charter amendments the WWD has become only the second water utility in the state of Maine to have authoritative powers to disconnect water service for non-payment of sewer user fees. This new piece of the Districts charter has helped provide a consistent revenue stream for the sewer division of the joint utility.

Construction of the much anticipated new drinking water pump station began in November 2006. A new water source that has been developed over the last two years includes an eight inch production well that will deliver safe, high yield water quantities to our customers. The new well will replace the two inch well points that have been experiencing diminished capacity over the last several years. Benefits realized from the project will include a safe and adequate water supply for our customers, a new energy efficient pump station, updated pump controls and monitoring equipment, an emergency back up power supply, increased fire protection service, and a significant increase in hydrant flushing capability.

District personnel conducted a system-wide flushing of all water mains, a process completed every year to maintain water quality and monitor the integrity of the system.

In 2006 the District has successfully applied for and received two financial grants from the Maine Drinking Water Program. A \$10,000 matching Capacity Development Grant has been awarded to the District to help fund the development of a Comprehensive System Facilities Plan. A \$5,000 Wellhead Protection Grant has also been awarded to the District for reimbursement of costs associated with protecting the area around the new water source. The District has been very successful with its grant applications receiving a total of \$10,000 in Wellhead Protection Grants in the last 2 years.

WWD continues to comply with EPA's Administrative Order to facilitate repairs to its sewer collection system. This year the District installed twelve manholes into its sanitary sewerage collection system to provide entrance points for the examination of suspected inflow and infiltration (I&I) problem areas. The closed circuit television inspection of the sewer lines will begin in spring of 2007.

WWD participates in a monthly area water utilities meeting, comprised of nine nearby water systems that share information and resources. The group meets at the Bangor Water District and collaborates on current issues, ways to reduce costs to our customers and maintaining quality customer services.

In closing, I wish to extend my thanks to the Board of Trustees, the Town of Winterport, our customers, and all of the District's employees for their support during the last 12 months.

Independent Auditors' Report

As we enter the 123rd Legislature, I would like to tell you what an honor it has been to serve as your State Senator. You, and the citizens of Waldo County, have continued to trust me with representing you in Augusta, and I look forward to effectively fulfilling this responsibility, and working for the changes that our Waldo County neighbors, and all the people of Maine, desire and deserve.

On November 7th, voters demanded that issues be dealt with so that Mainers can keep more of their income and provide for their families. I was sent to Augusta to address these issues, and to help make some real and tangible changes for the people of Waldo County. That is exactly what I intend to do.

In the 123rd Legislature, the Senate is nearly split down the middle— 18 Democrats and 17 Republicans. It will take some quality teamwork and effective leadership to make real changes. Dear Friends,

As you gather for your Annual Town Meeting, I welcome this opportunity to share some of the work that has made me proud to represent the people of Winterport and all of Maine in the United States Senate.

As Chairman of the Senate Homeland Security Committee, I am pleased to report that Congress made real progress in 2006 to protect our nation, including major legislation that I coauthored to improve the security of America's seaports. I also led a bipartisan effort to pass chemical security legislation that, for the first time, requires security measures at more than 3,400 chemical facilities nationwide.

Following the flawed response to Hurricane Katrina, the Homeland Security Committee conducted the most extensive investigation in its history, and I coauthored legislation that reorganizes and reunites the federal government's preparedness and response capabilities to meet the challenges of all aspects of emergency management.

Congress last year passed many pieces of legislation I authored to improve health care, assist those in need, protect our environment, support our economy and our workers, and strengthen our nation's defenses. The Older Americans Act includes my amendment to establish transportation services for America's seniors. I led the successful fight to reject proposed cuts in Medicare home health and hospice payments, and to prevent prescription drug plans from removing a drug from their formulary during the plan year. I have secured increased funding for diabetes and Alzheimer's research, and for support services for patients and their families.

In 2006, I helped secure a record level of funding for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), and Congress renewed the tax deduction I authored for teachers who spend their own money on classroom supplies and my renewable energy tax credit. The landmark Postal Reform legislation I coauthored will ensure affordable rates and preserve universal service. Major Defense bills include my provisions to help secure the future of Bath Iron Works and the jobs of our skilled shipbuilders.


